ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Read section 6 in Part 1 for general information about admission requirements, including English language proficiency.

Admission requirements are the minimum qualifications you need before you can be selected for admission to a course of study.

As an international student completing one of the following qualifications in 2017, you will apply for admission through UAC and will generally be selected on the basis of your performance in these studies (ie your ATAR or equivalent):

- an Australian Year 12 qualification (either outside or in Australia)
- an International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma
- a New Zealand National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 3.

When assessing your application, UON may take any or all of your qualifications or attempts at study into account.

Limited ATAR

The University accepts the NSW Limited ATAR for admission purposes – read section 3.4.

Additional selection criteria

In addition to achieving the standard of performance required for admission, for certain courses you must also satisfy any additional selection criteria, such as a portfolio of work or an audition. These criteria are taken into account either instead of, or in conjunction with, your ATAR or equivalent.

Details of additional selection criteria and how applicants can meet these requirements are outlined in the course descriptions on UAC's website at uac.edu.au/international/course-search.

If you are undertaking your Year 12 studies offshore and are applying for a course that has additional selection criteria that you will find difficult to meet, email ia@newcastle.edu.au.

Offers made to applicants who have an ATAR (or equivalent) below the cut-off

UON has alternative pathways for admission, which may allow applicants to receive an offer to a course even though they have an ATAR or equivalent below the published cut-off. These include the Regional and Rural Bonus Points Scheme and the Year 12 Bonus Points Scheme.

Regional and Rural Bonus Points Scheme

UON's Regional and Rural Bonus Points Scheme supports students from regional and rural Australia by awarding bonus points to 2017 HSC students who attend schools within a defined postcode boundary.

The scheme applies to all undergraduate programs available as per the course search at uac.edu.au/international/course-search.

Year 12 Bonus Points Scheme

STUDENTS UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE

Before you are granted a student visa, the Australian Government must be satisfied that you have appropriate accommodation, support and general welfare arrangements in place for the period that you will be under 18 years of age while in Australia.

UON may accept responsibility for welfare arrangements for international students who are under 18 years of age.

TUITION FEES

Tuition fees are calculated based on the subjects selected (eg BIOL1010) within each degree program (eg B Science) and are set according to their academic subject area. Your program fee may vary depending on your subject selection. Tuition fees are reviewed annually and are subject to change.

The tuition fees cover teaching costs only. The fees listed in the entries in the course search are a guide only and do not include international and domestic travel, accommodation and meals, books, living costs, the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) or Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) charges.

A deposit is payable on acceptance of an offer of a place in a degree program. The deposit will be used to pay OSHC and the SSAF, and the balance will be put towards the cost of your first semester tuition fees. If the total cost of your tuition fees exceeds the deposit amount, you are responsible for payment of the extra cost of the tuition. Subsequent payments are due once you complete the enrolment process for each semester and tuition fees have been calculated. You will be issued with an invoice stating the amount due for that semester.

Student Services and Amenities Fee

All international students will be required to pay a Student Services and Amenities Fee in 2018. The maximum amount in 2017 was A\$294 per year (indexed annually).

Fees policy

All fees must be paid in full and on time. Non-payment of tuition fees by the due date will result in the termination of a student's enrolment. The University has a preferred arrangement in place with Allianz Global Assistance to help students streamline this process. The University will deduct the cost of your health insurance from your deposit.

Students on certain scholarships and those with reciprocal health insurance arrangements in their home country are exempt from this requirement. If you are a Norwegian student, for example, you are exempt from health cover as this is provided under the Norwegian National Insurance Scheme.

HEALTH SERVICES ON CAMPUS

The health service provides medical centres staffed by doctors and nurses at our Newcastle and Central Coast campuses. Students can make an appointment to see a general practitioner about any health issue. Specialist mental health services, including a psychiatrist, are available at Callaghan.

PREPARING FOR STUDENT LIFE

In order to study in Australia, you must hold a valid student visa. If you come to Australia on a tourist visa and subsequently enrol at UON, you must convert your tourist visa to a student visa immediately. The University cannot make representations to the Department of Immigration and Border Protection with respect to visas of overseas students.

If you are offered admission, it will be to a full-fee program for students wishing to undertake studies at an Australian educational institution. The offer will not be to a scholarship, employment or immigration program.

As an international student, you must enrol in your program full-time. If you enrol in less than the required full-time load, you will be considered by the Department of Immigration and Border Protection to be in breach of your student visa conditions. As an international student you must fund your entire studies independently and leave Australia when your studies are complete and/or when your student visa expires, or when you cease to be eligible for a student visa. ACCEPTANCE, ENROLMENT, ORIENTATION AND DEFERMENT

Acceptance

You will have seven days from the date of offer to accept your offer. To accept your offer, follow the instructions provided to you with your offer letter. If you do not comply with the requirements listed for your program, your offer may lapse and you may not be permitted to enrol.

Enrolment

Enrolment at the University is carried out online. Instructions are provided at newcastle.edu.au/current-students/support/new-students/orientation/getting-started-undergrad/orientation-undergraduate-international/enrolment. Information will also be provided during orientation.

Orientation

Orientation is a fun and relaxed introduction and welcome to university life and facilities at the Newcastle – Callaghan, Newcastle City and Central Coast locations. You will also be able to meet faculty staff and ask them questions. For further information, visit newcastle.edu.au/international/while-you-are-here/orientation.

Students enrolling in programs offered by the Faculty of Health must attend an extended orientation up to three weeks before lectures start. Further information will be provided after you accept your offer.

Deferment

You will have seven days from the date of offer to defer. UON accepts applications to defer the commencement of most of its undergraduate courses for a maximum period of one year. You can only defer offers on the grounds of compassionate or compelling circumstances.

If you want to defer your offer, contact UON Global for information before accepting or deferring your offer. If the University does not receive your request for deferment within seven days of your offer, the offer may lapse and you may be required to re-compete for a place.

STUDENT SUPPORT

STUDENT AND CAMPUS SERVICES

Accommodation

Living on campus is a great way to make the most of university life. You'll have an opportunity to make new friends and get involved in a number of social, cultural and sporting activities while living in a unique residential community. With all costs included, and the convenience of living so close to class, the distinctive world of on-campus living is more affordable than you may think.

UON has a total of nine residences and over 1,700 beds at the Newcastle (Callaghan) and Central Coast (Ourimbah) campuses, including the new (2015) residential precinct at Callaghan consisting of four multistorey buildings, and apartment-style units. Another four residential colleges are available at Callaghan, including Barahineban, Edwards Hall, Evatt House and International House. Blue Gum House is the established residential college at our Central Coast (Ourimbah) campus, offering 26 ensuite rooms.

Each residence has a unique atmosphere and offers a choice of accommodation options, with either private or shared rooms and private or shared facilities. All rooms are fully furnished and you can choose from either full or semi-catered, or self-catered for more independence.

On-campus residents are supported by an integrated ResLife Programs that offers strong academic and social support and a wide variety of fun activities to cater for all tastes. Living on campus is a perfect transition for students leaving home for the first time or who are arriving from other towns, cities or countries.

The demand for on-campus accommodation is high. Do not wait until you receive your university offer to apply. Applications are expected to open in October 2017.
