ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

To be offered a place in a course at the University, you must meet the general requirements listed in one of the following categories, satisfy English language requirements and be selected in competition with other eligible applicants.

Western Sydney University recognises that there are many paths students can follow on the road to university study, including Year 12 studies, studies with TAFE and other VET providers, accredited studies offered in some workplaces,

studies at university that are complete or incomplete, foundation courses at an Australian university, the Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) and work experience.

You will be considered for entry to courses at the University on the basis of the outcomes you have achieved in any of the qualifications you hold. Your prior studies do not need to be relevant to the course in which you would like to study at Western.

Australian secondary studies

2017 Australian Year 12

If you are a 2017 Australian Year 12 student, you will be considered for admission on the basis of your ATAR or equivalent. Refer to individual course entries for any additional selection criteria.

Offers made to applicants who have an ATAR below the published cut-off

Western Sydney University has a number of alternative pathways for admission that may allow 2017 Australian Year 12 applicants to receive an offer to a course even though they have an ATAR or equivalent below the published cut-off. They include:

- Western Sydney University Advantage entry programs, including the guaranteed entry program, regional bonus points and subject bonus points
- Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS)
- Educational Access Scheme (EAS)
- Elite Athlete and Performer Bonus Scheme
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Alternative Entry Program (for Indigenous Australians).

Western Sydney University Advantage

Western Sydney University encourages students to pursue a university education by offering a number of advantages to help you achieve your higher education goals. For more information, visit westernsydney.edu.au/advantage.

Early offer opportunities (before ATAR release)

- **Academy Global Leaders Program** for high-achieving students planning to study an advanced degree, this program includes membership of The Academy, a \$2,000 Smart Start scholarship, an overseas academic or leadership experience and a guaranteed internship. Apply at westernsydney.edu.au/academy. Applications close **Friday 29 September 2017**.
- **Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS):** If you apply through UAC by **Friday 29 September 2017** you could be eligible for a huge range of courses before you ATAR is released (read section 5.5 in Part 1 for further information).

Guaranteed Entry opportunities (at ATAR release date)

Receive an offer from Western on ATAR release day, Friday 15 December 2017. Details and Guaranteed Entry registration will be released later this year. Visit westernsydney.edu.au/guaranteedentry to find out more.

Bonus points

There are a few ways you may be able to boost your selection rank by up to 10 bonus points. Bonus points apply to all Western Sydney University courses excluding those with additional selection criteria such as 725500 B Medicine/B Surgery, 720720 B Music, and 723560 B Physiotherapy.

- **Regional bonus points:** If you live or go to school in Western Sydney and are completing the NSW HSC or International Baccalaureate (IB) in 2017 you will automatically receive five bonus points when you apply through UAC to study at Western Sydney University. If you are a non-current school leaver (not completing the HSC or IB at the time of applying to university) and live or study in the Western Sydney region you also automatically receive five bonus points when you apply through UAC to study at Western Sydney University.
- **Subject bonus points:** Western Sydney University rewards outstanding academic achievement of 2017 HSC or IB students with up to 10 subject bonus points. You must achieve Band 5 or 6 results in HSC subjects relevant to the participating Western Sydney University course you want to study.
- **Educational Access Scheme (EAS):** EAS bonus points are awarded to applicants who have experienced long-term educational disadvantage. To qualify, you must demonstrate that your educational performance during Year 11 and/or Year 12, or equivalent, has been seriously affected by circumstances beyond your control. EAS applications are processed centrally through UAC. Read section 5.5 in Part 1 for further information.
- **Elite Athlete and Performer Bonus Scheme:** Western Sydney University is recognised as an elite athlete-friendly university and welcomes applications for the Elite Athlete and Performer Bonus Scheme. If you have been disadvantaged during your current or previous Year 12 studies due to performance and training commitments, you are encouraged to apply.

The College Diploma programs

Western Sydney University The College provides students with a clear pathway to Western Sydney University through its comprehensive range of Foundation Studies and Diploma programs. Depending on your results, completion of a Diploma course guarantees you entry to the second year of the corresponding Bachelor degree at Western. Diploma courses are offered in a format to prepare students with a variety of skill levels, from those who have a competitive ATAR, to those who did not receive an ATAR at all or who have not studied for a long time.

Previous Australian Year 12

If you have completed an Australian Year 12 before 2017, you may be considered for entry on the basis of your ATAR or equivalent. This includes studies accumulated over consecutive years with the approval of the appropriate state education board.

Australian tertiary studies

If you have completed or partly completed any tertiary studies, including TAFE courses, accredited AQF courses from private colleges or previous university studies, you may be considered for admission on the basis of those studies. Refer to individual course entries for any additional selection criteria.

Where individual course entries refer to a guarantee of admission following completion of a relevant Diploma or registered nurse status, this guarantee does not override English language proficiency requirements. Guaranteed entry to courses will only be applied in the Main Round of offers.

Exclusion: Western Sydney University will not make an offer to anyone currently excluded from any higher education course. If you have served the period of exclusion, your application will be considered.

Current students

If you are studying a course at Western Sydney University in 2017 and wish to transfer to another course for 2018, check the transfer requirements at westernsydney.edu.au/transfer as you may be eligible to apply within the University for transfer to your chosen course.

Overseas qualifications

Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia with overseas qualifications can contact Western Sydney University to discuss eligibility for admission. For information on overseas secondary qualifications, visit uac.edu.au/undergraduate/admission/overseas.shtml.

If you hold qualifications from countries where English is not the standard language of instruction, you must provide evidence of English language proficiency – for requirements visit uac.edu.au/undergraduate/admission/elp.shtml.

Alternative entry and pathways

If you do not have any of the formal educational qualifications outlined in the previous categories, you may be eligible for entry into the University on the basis of one of the following.

Employment experience

Your application can be considered for entry to most Western Sydney University courses on the basis of work experience.

A vocational rank, based on paid employment of one year or more, is determined by the type of work and the length of service. For further details, visit uac.edu.au/undergraduate/admission/employment.shtml. Undocumented employment experience will not be considered.

University Foundation Studies at The College

University Foundation Studies programs are designed for students who need to build up a set of academic study and subject skills before undertaking a university degree. These one- or two-term programs are ideally suited to students who: have not performed to their full potential in their HSC; do not possess the specific prerequisites or assumed knowledge for the degree of their choice; or have not studied for some time and need to bring their study skills up to date. Successful completion of The College University Foundation Studies offers guaranteed direct entry into specific Western Sydney University first-year undergraduate programs. Applications are not through UAC and must be made direct to The College via applyonline.westernsydney.edu.au.

Special Tertiary Admissions Test

If you have not completed an Australian Year 12, do not possess any formal qualification, or want to improve your chances of selection, you are advised to sit the Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT).

For further information visit stat.acer.org. Refer to individual course descriptions for any special STAT requirements.

If you have previously sat a STAT, Western Sydney University will look at STAT results from 2014 onwards. If you have more than one STAT result, we will consider the best result of any STAT sitting from 2014 onwards. STAT is considered for all courses except those with additional selection criteria.

Limited ATAR

If you are eligible for a Limited ATAR, your application will be considered on this basis. For information on the Limited ATAR, read section 2.4 in Part 1.

SCHOOLS RECOMMENDATION SCHEMES

Western Sydney University participates in the Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS), processed centrally through UAC, allowing Year 12 students who are UAC applicants to receive early offers of undergraduate admission. SRS aims to assist access to higher education using selection criteria other than the ATAR, including school recommendations and senior secondary studies.

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEMES

Western Sydney University has an Educational Access Scheme (EAS), called the Western Sydney University Special Consideration Scheme, to assist students who have been disadvantaged during their current or previous Year 12 studies, including students with a disability.

EAS applications are processed centrally through UAC. Read section 5.5 in Part 1 for more information on EAS.

EQUITY SCHOLARSHIPS

Western Sydney University offers a number of Equity Scholarships which are open to all eligible applicants applying to or enrolled at the University: Western Sydney University Opportunity Scholarships for commencing and continuing students; Western Sydney University Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Achievement Scholarships; and Indigenous Commonwealth Scholarships.

All Western Sydney University Equity Scholarships applications are processed centrally through UAC. Read section 7.6 in Part 1 for more information on Equity Scholarships.

SPECIAL CONSIDERATION

Elite athletes or performers

Western Sydney University is recognised as an elite-athlete-friendly university. The Western Sydney University's Elite Athlete and Performer Bonus Scheme encourages applications from students who have been disadvantaged during their current or previous Year 12 studies due to performance and training commitments.

To be considered, you need to complete the 'Elite Athletes or Performers Scheme Application' form, found at westernsydney.edu.au/informationabout/bonuspoints/elite_athlete_and_performer_bonus_scheme, and submit it directly to the University, marked to the attention of Admissions.

Applicants will be advised if they meet the eligibility requirements for consideration.

ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER AUSTRALIANS

Western Sydney University offers a wide range of academic and support programs to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. On each of the campuses there is a dedicated support centre where students have access to a wide range of services including computer and printing facilities.

In addition to applying through UAC, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander applicants may wish to be considered for alternative entry through the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Alternative Entry Program. BRIDGING COURSES

If you do not have the assumed knowledge indicated in a course description, you are still eligible to apply for that course. ENROLMENT

Acceptance of offer

Information about accepting your offer, important dates and enrolling is available on the Western Sydney University website at westernsydney.edu.au/starting.

Advanced standing/academic credit

Western Sydney University will consider applications for advanced standing on the basis of previous studies or other experiences that you have successfully completed within 10 years of the date of your application for advanced standing.

You must submit your application at or before enrolment and attach certified copies of relevant supporting documents. For more information, visit westernsydney.edu.au/advancedstanding.

Deferment of offer

- One year only (for applicants admitted mid-year: six months only)
- All courses except B Midwifery
- Will not lapse if tertiary studies undertaken.

Fees and charges

All students must pay student contributions for a Commonwealth-supported place (CSP) – read section 7.2 in Part 1. Students are also required to pay the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF).

Scholarships

Western Sydney University recognises and rewards students who demonstrate outstanding academic ability, leadership and community service through the University's merit-based scholarships and The Academy program.

The University also awards donor-funded scholarships, providing support for students based on both academic achievements and equity considerations. Some of the scholarships available include:

- Vice-Chancellor's Leadership Scholarships – \$10,000/year for five years
- Dean's Scholarships – \$5,000/year for four years
- Academic Excellence Scholarships – \$5,000/year for four years
- Honours Scholarships – \$5,000 for one year
- International Exchange Scholarships – \$2,500 one-off payment.
